

SCENE: GENERAL MERRIN'S OFFICE

*[General Merrin is on phone. Colonel Parker enters.]*

GENERAL MERRIN *[into phone]*: What do you mean they won't let you have it! You can commandeer them! We want every plane that can fly in the air! *[Hangs up; looks at Colonel Parker.]* Tad, just a minute. *[Phone rings. He picks it up.]* Merrin. *[Pause.]* I know there are some of them that don't know the territory. *[Pause.]* I know some of them have never been to Berlin. *[Pause.]* Major, we have to give the Military Governor every help we can give him. We have to get seven hundred tons in the air a day. Seven hundred tons! *[Hangs up. Looks at Colonel Parker. Shakes his head a little.]* This airlift is some operation. We have to get 700 tons of produce to Berlin every day. Did you ever think we would be flying coal and tomatoes in these crates? *[Pause.]* Tad we've always been good friends and that's why I called you in. I want to know what you're going to do in that courtroom tomorrow.
